

Francesco Camia is Associate Professor of Greek Epigraphy at Sapienza Università di Roma, from which he holds a PhD in Ancient History (2007). Previously, he had obtained a Master in Archaeology and Greek Epigraphy (“Specializzazione”) at the Italian Archaeological School at Athens (2001-2003). From 2008 to 2015 he has been a Researcher at the Institute of Historical Research (Section of Greek and Roman Antiquity) of the National Hellenic Research Foundation in Athens. His research activity is focused on the study of the Greek world in the Roman period, with a specific interest in issues related to the religious landscape of cities (cultic, socio-economic and institutional aspects). His research covers the following topics: Greek epigraphy; Greek religion; economy of cults; institutional and social aspects in the Greek world during the Roman period; Roman Thrace. He has studied in depth the Roman imperial cult in Greece, a topic on which he has published various articles and the monograph *Theoi Sebastoi. Il culto degli imperatori romani in Grecia (provincia Achaia) nel secondo secolo d.C.* (Athens 2011), as well as the relations between Rome and the Greek poleis in the Hellenistic period (*Roma e le poleis. L'intervento di Roma nelle controversie territoriali tra le comunità greche di Grecia e d'Asia Minore nel secondo secolo a.C.: le testimonianze epigrafiche*, Athens 2009).
