How to write a review paper for the course: sources, methodology and assignment of topics to students Lesson X

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Assessment

- To pass the exam, students must undertake the drafting of a paper consisting of a review of works of reference in the literature. The topic will be selected on the student's proposal with the teacher's agreement.
- Students choose at least **TWO JOURNAL ARTICLES** on the same topic for review.
- The paper of approximately 10 pages must be sent (in Pdf format) to the e-mail address of the instructor at least one week prior the exam session.
- A positive assessment will result in a PASS grade (note that scores in points CANNOT be given for this course).



Method

- The *review paper* should follow a **formal structure**:
 - *Introduction*: present the topic covered and why it is relevant.
 - **Body**: in 3-5 paragraphs, review carefully the main contents and arguments of the two articles. If there are contending arguments discuss their differences, otherwise explain how the two articles may speak to each other (and to the selected topic). Always make specific reference to the two reviewed articles and to their authors, vagueness will result in *exam failure*!
 - *Conclusion*: summarise the main arguments of the two articles and their relevance in the field of International organisation studies.

A coherent structure of contents: an example

With reference to the addressed topic, this paper aims at reviewing two journal articles, specifically [....]

- Quote the first article.
- Quote the second article.

The main aim of the two authors is to understand the ways in which these two different organizations manage crises by analyzing the institutional and political context.

- AUTHOR I focussed on the international organization X and its crisis management.
- AUTHOR II focussed on the international organization Y and its crisis management.

As to the explanation of different outcomes, the two authors pay particular attention to the IOs' 'bureaucratic autonomy' that is greater in the international organization X compared to Y.

- AUTHOR I assessed the bureaucratic autonomy of the organization I and concluded that [...]
- AUTHOR II assessed the bureaucratic autonomy of the organization II and concluded that [...]

Things not to do



- *Plagiarism*: every paper is scanned through anti-plagiarim softwares, only short quotatios allowed, plagiarism will result in a FAIL grade.
- Forget to cite the selected articles in the text (with full reference given in footnote, or in a reference list at the end of the paper).
- Consider the selected articles just a point of departure: they should be instead the focus of your paper.
- Expand the research beyond the selected articles: you should write a review paper of two articles, NOT an extensive research paper.
