# AFRICA AND LATIN AMERICA IN GLOBAL ECONOMIC HISTORY (6CFU) Global Humanities - Prof. Donatella Strangio

#### Course contents

The study program analyzes historical and economic facts through the kaleidoscopic and original perspective of colonialism and decolonization, underlining the importance that the latter holds for the understanding of current phenomena such as inequalities, migrations, the breakdown of territories, finance. The course offers an in-depth overview of the topics covered - colonization, decolonization, globalization, the role of institutions -, examining them from the point of view of economic history, implementing them with multiple references to current events, such as inequality between states and regions and migration policies. The socio-economic changes in the various areas of the globe that compose it are thus reconstructed, highlighting the factors that have influenced the consolidation of the current world economic system with particular reference to the area of Latin America and Africa and Asia and showing how, after the crisis of 2007 and even more so with the pandemic crisis of 2020, it is now necessary to create new rules and new institutions for the increasingly numerous excluded and castaways of globalization. Specifically, the course will be articulated in addressing: - Methodological aspects. Economic system - European Colonialism; China; Japan; Ameriucas; Africa; The Role of Institutions; Decolonization; Cold War; The rest of the world; Globalization; Cooperation; Crisis and The Debts; International Migration; De-growth and new rules for the economy -

In-depth seminars on specific topics are planned with industry experts. Study groups will be organized, which will be considered valid for the final exam.
